STATEMENTS DY HINISTERS

HON. G. PRICE (Prime Hinister): Hr Speaker, I wish to put on record the steps taken by the Government of Belize since assuming the status of Independence on the 21st of September to consolidate the international position of the new Nation of Belize. These steps include admission to the United Nations, Hombership in the Non-aligned Hovement and confirmation of Nembership in the Commonwealth.

Within five days of Independence, Belize successfully secured admission to the United Nations. She did so over objections naised by Guotemala in both the Security Council and the General Assembly. These objections became all the more significant because they were based upon arguments by Guatemala that Belize was not a Utate in legal sense since Guatemala argued Belize had no territory; its territory belong to Guatemala according to the statement made by the Foreign Minister of Guatemala - not by the Foreign Minister, by the Ambassador of Guatemala to the United Nations.

The Security Council rejected this contention on the part of Guatemala, and by a unanimous vote recommended the admission of Belize as a legally constituted state.

The General Assembly repudiated the argument of Guatemala by a vote of over 144 in favour of the admission of Belize, no abstentions, and only Guatemala voting against. In effect, therefore, Guatemala remains the only country in the world refusing to recognise Belize with all her torritory. On the same day, the Friday, the 25th of September, Belize was admitted to the Non-aligned Hovement thereby expanding its special status in the Hovement to full membership.

Although the Commonwealth had earlier taken a decision that Belize became a full member of the Organization upon its becoming independent, Bolize consolidated that position by being admitted on the 30th of Coptember to the Commonwealth Heads of Governments Meeting in Melbourne, Australia. The Belize Delegation was able to ensure the participation of the Commonwealth should assistance be required in finding a lasting settlement in accordance with the Heads of Agreement. This was achieved by an extension of the life of the Commonwealth Committee on Belize with a new mandate.

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The terms of that decision is included in the Communique issued by the Heeting, from which I quote, with your permission, Hr Speaker (and I quote): "Heads of Government reviewed developments leading to the Independence of Belize. They expressed satisfaction with the role played by the British Government and veloemed its commitment to make adequate provision for the security of Belize. They commended the Commonwealth Hinisterial Committee on Belize for the effective manner in which it had discharged its mandate.

Noting the continuing threat to the socurity of Belize in the absence of a final sottlement with Guatemala, Heads of Governments reaffirmed their full support for the efforts of the Government of Belize to maintain Belize's territorial integrity and to achieve a final resolution of the outstanding issues on the basis of the Heads of Agreement signed in London on the 11th of March 1981. They requested the Secretary-General to convene the committee whenever necessary to assist the Government of Belize in finding a lasting sottlement in accordance with the Heads of Agreement.

They noted the helpful attitude of the United States Government as reflected in its affirmative vote for the Delize resolution in the United Nations General Assembly in 1980 and expressed confidence that this attitude would be maintained." (unquoth).

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Finally, I wish to report that Belize has so far been granted observer status in the Organization of American States. By the terms of the charter of that Organization, Belize does not qualify for full membership because of the dispute between Gustemala and the United Kingdom over Belize. Government is determined, however, to pursue full membership of that Organization as seen as circumstances allow.

MON. A. SMOHAN (Hinister of Health, Housing and Cooperatives): Mr Speaker, I rise to make a short statement relating to the Paper I laid on the Table this morning.

A Belizean delegation from the Ministry of Health comprising the Minister and the Chief Medical Officer, paid an official visit to Costa Rice from the 18 to 24 of October. The delegation was received by the Minister of Health of Costa Rica, Dr Carmelo Carbosa, and held meetings with their heads of section of the Ministry, with the directors of the Social Security Scheme, the University and the College of Physicians and Surgeons, and also visited several institutions and programs in the health sector.

On the 23 October, an Agreement on Cooperation in the Field of Health was signed by two Health Ministers. This Agreement provides, among other things -

- (1) that the Hinistry of Health of Costa Rica will organise programs of technical assistance and offer professional advice in the areas required by us;
- (2) for the professional and technical training of persons nominated by our Government;

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- (3) for the specialized training of Belizean doctors in areas of priority determined by us;
- (4) for scholarships in medicine, nursing and paramedical personnol;
- (5) for shortterm training and refresher courses, both in Costa Rica and in Bolize; and for highly specialised modical attention to be given to Belizeans in Costa Rica where this cannot be provided at home; and also for other areas to be agreed upon in the future.

In order to carry the ..grooment forward, the Ministry of Health of Belize is inviting the Costa Rican Minister of Health and his team of officials and collaboration to visit Belize in early December.

While in Costa Rica, Hr Speaker, I had occasion to speak to the Foreign Minister, Dornd Nichaus, and President Rodrigo Caraso who assured me of this Government's policy to continue to work together with the Government of Delize to promote peace, stability and democracy in Central America and to cooperate with us for the economic and social development of Delize.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

1. International Financial Organizations Dill, 1981

HGN. G. PRICE (Prime Hinister): I rise to introduce a Bill for an Act to enable Delize to become a Nember of the International Monetary Fund, the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, the International Finance Corporation and the International Development Association.

Mr Speaker, Belize must take full advantage of the opportunities offered by its independence. We must consolidate traditional sources of capital finance. We must ensure continuity and we must open new avenues for financing private and public sector projects. Membership of major international financial institutions is essential.

As a first step and to carry out a decision of the National Assembly, it is proposed that D_olize seeks membership of the International Monetary Fund, the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, more commonly known as the World Bank, the International Finance Corporation and the International Development Association.

Dill read a First Time and ordered to be printed.

2. Defence (/mendment) Dill, 1981

HON. V. H. CCURTEN/Y (Minister of State): Mr Speaker, I beg to introduce for its First Reading a Bill for an Act



to amend the Defence Urdinance 1977 (No. 8 of 1977) to give effect to the changes made necessary by the Belize Constitution and to provide for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto.

Bill read a First Time and ordered to be printed.

NR SPEAKER: Honourable Members, this Bill is referred to the Internal Affairs and Labour Committee for examination, consideration and report.

3. - Delizean Nationality Bill, 1981

NON. V.N. COURTERNY (Minister of State): Mr Speaker, I beg to move the First Reading of a Bill for an Act to make provision for citizenship of Delize and for matters connected therewith.

Bill read a First Time and ordered to be printed.

MR SPEAKER: Honourable Membors, this Bill is referred to the Constitution and Foreign Affairs Committee for examination, consideration and report.

4. Labour (Amendmont) Dill, 1981

HON. D.L. HCKUY (Hinister of Social Services, Labour and Community Development): Ar Opeaker, I rise to introduce a Bill for an Act to amend the Labour Ordinance No. 15 of 1959.

This amendment deals specifically with the matter of payment of severance pay in respect of periods not covered by social security benefits, whether severance pay arises under the Labour Ordinance or under a collective agreement or a contract of service.

This Honourable House will recall, Hr Speaker, that the Social Security Ordinance No. 6 of 1979 came into force on 1 June, 1981. On that date, Section 189 of the Labour Ordinance made Section 178 Clause (1) of the said Labour Ordinance null and void in relation to any worker whose employer is contributing to the Sectial Gecurity Scheme. It is precisely for this reason, Hr Speaker, that this amendment is brought about to ensure that our Delizean workers are not deprived of their benefits once earned.

Bill read a First Time and ordered to be printed.

MR SPEAKER: Nonourable Hembors, this will is referred to the Internal Affairs and Hobour Committee for examination, consideration and report.

5. Mildlife Protoction Dill, 1981

HON. F.J. MARIN (Himistor of Natural Resources): Mr Speaker, I rise to introduce a Dill for an Act to provide for the conservation, restoration and development of wildlife, for the regulation of its use and for all other matters connected therewith.

Dill read a First Time and ordered to be printed.

MR SPEAKER: Honourable Hembers, this Bill is referred to the Economic Development Committee for examination, consideration and report.

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6. National Parks Cystem Bill, 1981

HON. F.J. MARIN (Hinister of Natural Resources): Mr Speaker, I rise to introduce a Dill for an Act to provide for the preservation and protection of highly important natural and cultural foatures, for the regulation of the scientific, educational and recreational use of the same and for all other matters connected therewith or incidental thereto.

MON. F.J. MARIN (Minister of Natural Resources): Mr Speaker, on behalf of the Hember for Corozal North, I rise to introduce a Bill for an Act to provide for the Incorporation of the Iglesia Evangolica El Calvario (Belize).

ADJOURNHENT

HON. G. PRICE (Prime Ministor): I move that the House do now adjourn, to Friday, November 14.

NON. P.S.M. GOLDSCH (Albert): Mr Speaker, I would like to put in a plea with the Government to undertake a rescue mission as far as the streets of Delize City are concerned.

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I think the situation of the streets, Mr Speaker, has reached the proportions of an emergency, and it calls for emergency action. The streets of Delize City, I think, it will be readily agreed on an objective basis, have never been as bad as they are at this memert. Just take a few examples entering the City: the read by the Cometery, the extension of the Central American Doulevard, Delphin Street, Fairweather Street, Dean Street, and a number of other streets. On the Northeide of the City; such streets as Mopp Street are unpassable.

I think, Hr Spoaker, that it is clear that in the interest of the residents of Bolize City, and indeed of the whole Country, that the Government should intervene. And I would go so far as to say that perhaps this matter of the streets of Bolize City, is a matter which has reached such a stage that all sides involved should come together and try to evolve some programme which will once and for all put the streets on a usable basis. If think the Opposition would be very happy to join with the Government and the City Council in a dialogue for the involving of a programme for the streets of Belize City. I think it has reached a stage where it cannot be handled merely on a partison basis. It's an emergency, and should be dealt with as such.

HON. G. PRICE (Prime Hinister): Hr Speaker, the Opposition did not mention the recent weather condition.

Yes, some streets are bad, but I would dare say that some streets are better than they were two years ago. And work is going on. But we do welcome his offer of cooperation so that we can improve and speed up what is going on now when the weather holds up and the sun comes out again and the ground is dry.

HON. T. ARAHDA (Leader of the Opposition): Mr Speaker, for the records, I think the Opposition has to make it clear that the Heads of Agreement as a solution for the Anglo-Guatemalan problem are very very objectionable to the Opposition. We have gone through some protty bad experiences when the Heads were introduced. We continue requesting that adequate solution be found to the problem alright, but not as the Heads of Agreement as a base.

We, therefore, reitorate to the Government and to the international world that the Opposition of Delize and all those bodies that supported the Opposition on that issue give consideration again to the Needs of Agreement as a solution because it has, in fact, split bolize on this basic issue. And it remains objectionable to the Opposition as a solution to the problem between Great Unitain and Guatemals.

NON. G. PRICE (Prime Minister): We note the statement made by the Monourable Leader of the opposition.

However, I would also like to add, Ar Speaker, that it was encouraging to note the unity and the joy that pervaded throughout the Country of Belize in the Independence celebrations.

The Heads of Agreement stand and are in force. De have made known, publicly, our understanding of the Heads of Agreement. Our understanding is that all these Heads in no

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way prejudice the principles of sovereighty and territorial integrity of Bolize. And on these principles we continue to stand.

I would like to point out to the Honourable Members across the aisle, that they must not forget that the Heads of Agreement do involve the United Kingdom. So that even after Independence, there is a residual important obligation of the United Kingdom to help belize find a solution to which it did not create. ...ny other solution that may be pursued may run the danger of excluding one of the two principal parties to the problem.

Delize's number one priority in its foreign policy is to help find a solution to the Anglo-Guatemalan dispute, which we did not cause; but which, it could be described constitutionally, an Independent State did inherit. But in no way that dispenses or excludes, eliminates the obligation of the United Kingdom, which only recently was reasserted by His Excellency the High Commissioner of the United Kingdom to Delize that the United Kingdom stands by these Heads of Agreement and is involved in endeavouring to find a solution to the Anglo-Guatemalan dispute.

On our part, in all public statements at the United Nations, at the Commonweelth; in Melbourne, Australia, in Delize, we have made the statement that we want friendship, we hold out the hand of friendship to Guatemala and we want to find a solution to the Anglo-Guatemalan dispute without prejudice to principles of - I keep on repeating them because they are important - sovereignty and territorial integrity.

To are doing everything possible at the moment to resume the work of the Joint Commission to find such a solution and we do appeal to the Leader of the Opposition and his party to try and understand the international implication and the importance of the Deads of Agreement as a possible means; in fact, I would say at this moment, the only means, that are seen as an instrument to try and solve the Anglo-Guatemalan dispute.
